Texan navy. A survey of the three vessels comprising the navy of the late Republic of Texas has been made recently by captain Randolph of the U. States navy. Their hulls were reported to be in excellent order, but the upper works had been much injured by exposure in a warm climate. The "Archer," an 18 gun brig, draws two feet and a half less with every thing on board than our largest class of schooners. The "Austin," a ship, has a heavier battery for her draught than any vessel in our navy, and draws three feet less than any of our sloops of war. The "St. Bernard" is a schooner of 7 guns.

The .Austin, late Texan sloop of war, was towed to sea from Galveston on the 24th ult. bound to Pensacola for repairs, after which it is said she is to be placed in commission in our navy under command of George N. Hollins, esq.

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
