Located next to the lovely historical Good Shepherd Anglican Church and the Acton Cemetery, you will find the smallest state park in Texas. It is the resting place of Elizabeth Patton Crockett, wife of the legendary David Crockett, making it a fitting location for a "stroll through Texas" opportunity for students. The Texas Independence Day Celebration features Texas history exhibits and period music. It is estimated well over six hundred 7th and 8th grade students and teachers attend this history celebration, during the first two days of the fair alone. On the 3rd day of the fair, the public was invited to attend. With over 200 Texas flags lining the street, it is an impressive site to see.

All day, for two days, school buses arrived and departed, as students took an extremely well-organized tour of the history exhibits. There were Indians explaining the Indian's role in Texas history. There were blacksmiths hand-crafting items needed by the settlers. Several chuck wagons, with settlers, talked about what people ate and how they prepared their food in the early years. There were soldiers and ladies representing the Civil War. The Sons of the American Revolution, Sons of the Confederate Veterans, and the Daughters of the American Revolution were represented at the event, among others. Several of David Crockett's descendants were present. A Civil War medical tent, with doctors and nurses, represented the Civil War. There were reenactors for Sam Houston, Davey Crockett, William Travis, John Smith, and others, who spoke first-person about their lives and the roles they played in Texas history. Canons sounded, and there were several memorial services honoring Elizabeth Crockett. People praised the men who fought for Texas, who forever accomplished deeds, and sacrificed their lives, for a mission that has impacted us all. Students were taught how our Texas heroes had stamina, physical endurance, and plain ole' good common sense.

I was absolutely thrilled at how graciously the organizers of this history fair welcomed the







Texas Navy. The organizers provided The Texas Navy the best venue, and they brought me lunch each day. On behalf of our association, I presented our program, with our video, in the beautiful Historical Good Shepherd Anglican Chapel, with reenactor John Smith, the courier for General Travis, who sought more men to fight in the Battle of the Alamo. For 3 days, Mr. Smith told his story about the Alamo and I told our story about The Texas Navy.

When I asked the students and their teachers about The Texas Navy, their eyes got big and they were totally silent. Even teachers seemed to be taken off guard. It quickly became evident to me that children and adults know little to nothing about the Texas Navy. Our Texas history must inspire, enrich, and enlighten people's minds and hearts. As the Texas Navy members already know, it is our mission to teach our young people about the Texas Navy. Students need to understand that the legacy from the past is instrumental to their own legacy....something much bigger than just themselves. They need to know about the men and ships who accomplished deeds, with lives sacrificed, for the great state of Texas. In 1835, David Crockett said he believed Texas was the garden spot of the world. I agree. Texas is where seeds of patriotism should be planted in the hearts and minds of our youth, to enable them to swear an allegiance to their great state of Texas and to their great country.



I suggest The Texas Navy Association present our story again next year...same place...same time. Texas Independence Day is an opportune time to talk about the Texas Navy in Acton, Texas. It would be my honor to formulate the plans needed to participate in the Hood County-Texas Heroes Foundation History Fair, for Texas Independence Day, next year.





Hawkins Squadron

The Charles E. Hawkins Squadron in Galveston had a busy

▲ spring in 2018.

The meeting of the Hawkins Squadron in Galveston on March 1 was one of the best yet – and that's saying something. The guest was Steve Curley, Professor of English and Literature at Texas A&M University at Galveston. Steve took us on a voyage of sea chanteys, mixed in with

a little lore and history. He wisely forgot to mention that it was an audience-participation event, until the food was served and attendees

couldn't leave. Smart man. The numbers included "Rio Grande;" "Haul Away, Joe;" "Boston Harbor;" "New York Gals;" and "Leave Her, Johnny!" Such great fun.

On the weekend of April 5-8, the Galveston Historical Foundation served as host of the Tall Ships Galveston event, that brought together historic replica and sail training vessels from around the world. Galveston was the first stop on the 2018 Tall Ships



Challenge, a series of annual events organized by Tall Ships America. These events draw hundreds of thousands of people to witness beautiful tall ships from the age of sail and provides a unique opportunity for the participants to interact with the crews of different vessels in friendly rivalry as they race from port to port.

Members of the Hawkins Squadron, as well as the Texas Navy Association generally, volunteered at several events during the weekend, and sailed aboard craft accompanying the Tall Ships during the parade of vessels during the Parade of Sail on Thursday, April 5.


Two of the visiting vessels might have been of particular interest





to TNA members. The schooner Lynx is a replica of an American privateer from the War of 1812, launched at Fell's Point, Maryland. In general appearance she resembles the classic Baltimore Clipper type, and is probably very similar overall to the topsail schooners used by the Texian Navy in the 1830s and 40s – in particular, Independence and Invincible of the First Texas Navy, and San Bernard, San Antonio, and San Jacinto of the Second Texas Navy. In fact, Lynx is so close that we adapted an image of her, with permission, as the header image for the Hawkins Squadron website.

The sailing school ship Oliver Hazard Perry is similar in overall size and appearance to the flagship of the Second Texas Navy, the sloop-of-war Austin. The verisimilitude is not quite as good here (that's where the squinting comes in), but she still gives a pretty good overall impression of what Austin must have looked like back in the day.




On April 21, San Jacinto Day, members of the Hawkins Squadron joined members of other TNA squadrons to participate in ceremonies at the San Jacinto Battleground. Hawkins Squadron member Adm. Jim Bevill had the honor of narrating the reenactment of the battle.

On Thursday, May 3, the Hawkins Squadron hosted a presentation by Grace Tsai, a PhD student in the Nautical Archaeology Program at Texas A&M who's doing some really interesting work on food and nutrition at sea in the 17th century, based on historical accounts and archaeological evidence (e.g., butchered animal bones found in shipwrecks). The central aspect of her research includes recreating historical shipboard victuals according to traditional methods, and then testing how well they preserve (or not) aboard ship during a long, simulated sea voyage. Fortunately for her, the research does not require actually consuming the resulting rations. One not entirely surprising finding — period sailors consumed about 30x the current recommended upper daily intake limit for sodium.

Ms. Tsai graduated with bachelor degrees in Psychology and Anthropology from the University of California, San Diego in 2011. Currently, she is a PhD student in the Nautical Archaeology Program at Texas A&M University. Her work focuses on understanding post-medieval seafaring life through analysis of diet and physical labor on sailors' health. Her most recent field work includes the Gnaliç Project, an excavation of a sixteenth-century Venetian galley that sank off the coast of Croatia, the Burgaz Harbor Project, an excavation of Hellenistic harbors in Turkey, and the Shelburne Steamboat Project, an excavation of a steamboat

graveyard in Vermont.

Also on May 3, the Hawkins Squadron hosted the commissioning of Captain Frank Dietz of Brazoria County. Captain Dietz, a 22-year veteran of the U.S. Coast Guard, holds a 100-ton





Master's License and operates a retired 82-foot Coast Guard Patrol Boat, that he uses with the Sea Scouts program to enable scouts to meet their qualifications. He also operates the 60-foot sternwheel paddleboat Yellowstone on the San Bernard River in Brazoria County. Yellowstone and Captain Dietz appear in the recent Texas Navy Association production, "How the Texas Navy Saved the Revolution," which is distributed for free use by educators across the state.

On Thursday, May 10, Adm. Andy Hall gave a presentation at the Houston Maritime Museum on the capture of the schooner Pelícano by the Texian Navy schooner Liberty in March 1836. Although this was one of the Navy's lesser-known fights, it was in many ways one of the most dramatic and important to the success of the new Republic.

Going into the summer of 2018, the Hawkins Squadron looks to the presentations on hurricane preparedness and the "Ike Dike" (July 12), and more activities related to the Texas Navy and local maritime history. We're looking toward hosting the commissioning of some new Admirals, and lots of other good work to keep the history of the Texas Navy alive and well.



Saturday February 24, 2018, the Sam Houston Chapter of the Sons of the Republic of Texas hosted a gravesite marker dedication to honor Sam Houston IV's term as President General of The Sons of the Republic of Texas. Sam Houston was also a Texas Navy Admiral at the time


